Connect, Educate, Inspire

- Connect, empower, educate and inspire youth and their adult mentors from across the state through website, social media and other outreach.

Leadership & Empowerment



Empower, fund and support youth in taking action in their communities to build protective factors and address risk factors.

Pilot a youth- informed social marketing campaign in Southwestern Alaska, to be scaled up to a regionally adaptable and statewide campaign.

Youth Engagement-Communities

- Girls on the Run (Girls on the Run is an after-school program designed to inspire girls of all abilities to recognize and embrace their inner strength. Lessons emphasize the important connection between physical and emotional health).
- Boys Run I toowu Klatseen (envisions boys and men possessing "strength of spirit." Through our ten-week program composed of running, discussion, and culturally based activities that honor Southeast Alaska traditional values participants will gain the skills they need to build healthy relationships and create a community of respect for self and others.


